She also shares the inspiration for her new book, *Garden Wonderland*, as she provides an introduction and takes us on a photographic tour of some of the inspiring and beautiful garden spaces she and her team have created around the San Francisco Bay Area.

Leslie Bennett is the founder and owner of Pine House Edible Gardens, an Oakland-based landscape design/build firm that creates aesthetic edible gardens and productive outdoor spaces. She is also the founder of the Black Sanctuary Gardens project and is co-author of *Garden Wonderland* (Ten Speed Press, 2024) and *The Beautiful Edible Garden* (Ten Speed Press, 2013). Leslie was included on the Elle Decor A-List for 2023 and the two years preceding, was named a Top 50 Black Trailblazer by Oprah in 2022, and is a recipient of the American Horticultural Society's Landscape Design Award.



Leslie and her firm's work have been featured in *Architectural Digest*, *Elle Decor*, *Martha Stewart Living*, *Better Homes & Gardens*, *Sunset Magazine*, *The New York Times*, *Los Angeles Times*, *Gardenista* and more.

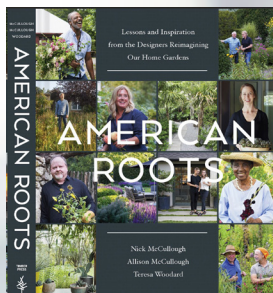

Trained in landscape architecture and professional horticulture, Jan has worked in Japan, Hawaii and Kenya, among other places. She is an inspiring speaker and loves to show how you can use plants and design to create serene outdoor spaces.

Jan taught at Columbia University for many years and still teaches at the New York Botanical Garden where she was named "Instructor of the Year." Her best-selling book, *Gardentopia*, (Countryman Press, an imprint of W.W. Norton) joins her other garden design books, *Heaven is a Garden*, *The Spirit of Stone* and *Floratopia*.

Japanese Garden Tour: Missouri Botanical Gardens (1 CEU)

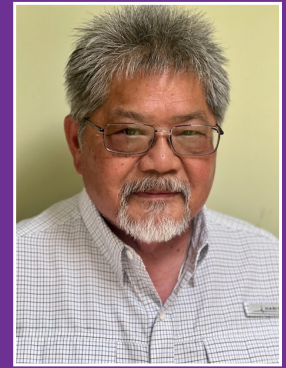
Presented by Ben Chu, Missouri Botanical Garden

Dedicated in 1977, it is one of the oldest and largest Japanese gardens in North America. This presentation will highlight many of the features of the 14-acre Japanese Garden, including its historical significance and unique design elements.

This garden represents an evolution of centuries of tradition and a multiplicity of distinctly Japanese cultural influences. Incorporating carefully designed plantings, waterfalls, beaches and islands, the Japanese Garden invites visitors to experience the thrill of personal interpretation and discovery in a serene landscape that’s uniquely beautiful in every season.

Ben Chu

Ben Chu has an AAS in Horticulture with an expertise in arboriculture. He began his career at Missouri Botanical Garden in 1982 as Horticulturist and was selected as Supervisor of the Japanese Garden in 1985. From 1985-1990 Ben worked with the late Koichi Kawana, designer of the Japanese Garden at Missouri Botanical Garden, gaining insight into his vision for the Japanese Garden. In September 1998, Ben traveled to Kyoto, Japan and participated in a two-week intensive seminar covering history, development, and appreciation of Japanese Gardens. In April 2012, he was awarded the Foreign Minister’s Commendation from the Japanese Ministry of Foreign Affairs that recognized his contributions to Japan/U.S. relations in the cultivation and promotion of the Japanese Garden. In 2016, Ben participated in the first Waza to Kokoro seminar at the International Japanese Garden Training Center in Portland, Ore. He has also served in various capacities on the Board of the North American Japanese Garden Association.

Paying close attention to the natural beauty of the island that occupies Acadia National Park, Bobbie will share her experience of how she problem-solved along the way to make a complicated project appear simple in the end by seamlessly blending the old with the new. The presentation is filled with photographs and drone imagery of the project area from the onset, and Bobbie will touch on her design philosophy and approach to working with clients to illustrate how with careful observance one's existing surroundings directly informs excellent design.

A landscape designer needs to develop working documents that may include: plans for planting and lighting design; installation details; layout for irrigation/hydrozones; recommendations and sourcing of various materials, furnishings, etc. These documents clarify your vision for the client and clarify for the landscape contractor, and others involved, what is required to provide accurate bids. As every landscape designer develops their unique skillset and style of communication, the execution of these presentation plans and details will take many forms.

Eileen and Laura will present their personal approaches to working documents and associated details, bringing their designs to life. They will also illustrate their process with images at the early stages, during installation and through to the finished project.

Bringing It All Together! Developing Strategic & Creative Design Concepts (1 CEU)

You have met with the client, collected site data, drawn up the base map and analyzed the functional direction of a project through site and functional analysis. You have established a budget. Working through the next phase – THE CONCEPTS – is often the most challenging, yet creative part of the landscape design process. How do you marry the client's wants and needs with the necessary technical aspects of a space and end up with a plan that satisfies those with an original, functional, and well-designed space?

Design is problem solving within a given set of circumstances. The development of CONCEPTS for a landscape design plan begins with all the information you have gathered (those circumstances) and ends with what you, as a designer, consider the best solutions. What plans, diagrams and other visuals do you choose to communicate your concept to the client? We will explore several ways to develop CONCEPTS that allow for maximum creativity, enhanced function, and unique client presentations.

Functional Site Analysis— Seeing the Big Picture Will Reveal Design Solutions (1 CEU)

Make the most of your site reconnaissance by developing your design concepts during early site visits. Neely's approach will give you a jump start on your design solutions. She'll explain that spending site time measuring space, notating the location of important elements and analyzing various patterns of water flow, sun/shadow, and views in/out are just the beginning of creating the first draft of a landscape design. With her approach, you will be less likely to miss critical information that will be important in finalizing the details of your design. This webinar will show you what to look for during reconnaissance, how to functionally analyze the information, begin the design process on site and take it back to the studio to continue next steps.

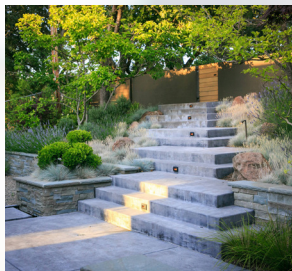

Every day in the green industry, we have the opportunity to leave the world a better place through good design and business choices. Sustainability is more than solar panels, electric or hybrid cars, recycling and wind mills. It is more than environmentalism, and also accounts for social equity and economic development. From web hosting on a green server, sustainability screened investments (yes, you can screen your portfolio and 401k retirement accounts!), reduced or organic pesticide and herbicides, container recycling to installation of carbon sequestering prairies and trees, businesses have the power for positive change. Inside Out Design uses natural resources, an earth berm greenhouse, an employee edible garden, reclaimed materials, native plants, and permeable pavement. 
