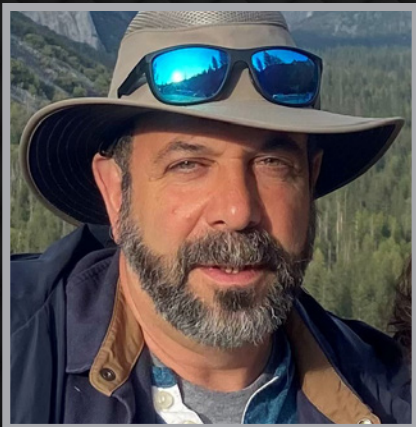

Tucked away off a beautiful, bustling street in Lafayette, California, David Thorne, Principal/Owner and Founder of David Thorne Landscape Architect, Inc. (DTLA), and his team crafted a serene brookside retreat nestled among mature oaks and coastal redwoods.

Former water-loving lawns and birch trees were thoughtfully revitalized into low-water gardens and peek-a-boo walks, once again delighting judges and earning DTLA the distinction of APLD’s 2025 Best of Show for the second year in a row.

### Inspiring a Welcoming and Serene Forever Home

Thorne’s clients purchased the lot and existing structures with plans to start afresh and build a forever home to age in gracefully. They dreamed of a space that would exude an understated and serene vibe with opportunities for both sun-drenched and shady spaces.

The property was reimagined to include a Mediterranean-style home and guest house, which fueled the DTLA team’s creativity.

“We took inspiration from the materiality of the house and the architecture,” said Thorne. “It’s the rare client that clads pretty much the entire house in stone, so we wanted to extend that stone and warmth out into the landscape and tie everything together.”



Following the home build, the landscape was a blank slate. The large lot enabled Thorne to provide global site planning that met client requests and embrace the property’s existing natural features, including a brook, mature oaks, and coastal redwoods. Thorne’s team strategically placed major elements of the design on the brook side of the house, drawing focus toward natural features and away from the busy road, while ensuring the street-side of the property also had special moments.



### Overcoming a Firetruck Turnaround, Busy Street, and Lots of Paving

One major challenge came with the entry to the property. The front driveway was required to serve as a turnaround for fire trucks. While the paving was significant, Thorne’s team masterfully minimized it by planting in key areas and utilizing impervious materials that were within code.

The hustle and bustle of the street posed another challenge. Thorne’s team initially proposed a stone wall with a series of concave and convex arcs, trailing vines, and gaps to allow light to pass through. Sadly, the Design Review Board denied the request. Thorne’s team shifted to a linear, sound-dampening fence that met requirements and fulfilled the clients’ needs and desires.

Thorne’s clients also wanted to take full advantage of California’s ideal climate for outdoor living.

“They wanted a fairly large swimming pool and all the requisites, some pool terraces and an outdoor fireplace,” Thorne stated. “It was kind of complex to weave in all that, in the sun and shade, protect the trees, and create focal points.”

Thorne’s team took a naturalistic approach to masterfully blend the hardscapes into the trees and banks of the brook.

### Softening Hardscapes With Planting Design

One of the judges praised the “... masterful connection between the materials and style of the home with the lush and perfect balance of rustic softscapes and pristine hardscapes.”

This resonated with Thorne. He praised the planting design by DTLA’s Kristina Kessel.

“A lot of the focus of the backyard, other than the pool area, is really planting design... embracing that concept of, how do you balance materials to be more soft and [create] softer, pristine landscapes,” said Thorne.

“Kristina and I were very deliberate about [our plant palette, composition, contrast, and form],” he continued. “On a large project like this, with the circulation path or journey, we try to create different garden spaces... through repeating material elements and foliage colors in various forms and applications.”

For example, the team used Purple Loropetalum in one spot or grouping, then a bit further, they chose Purple Berberis to repeat like colors, but change the texture.

One of the best examples of this is the putting green area, Thorne said. The team created an organic-shaped putting green and integrated it in a naturalistic way with a variety of plantings, camouflaging its true nature from a distance.

The team used many long-lived shrubs and ornamental grasses to create foundations – including Loropetalum, Abelia, Pittosporum, Lomandra, and Miscanthus – interspersed with pops of color from ground cover roses, perennial sages, and catmints.

“The putting green seamlessly blends into the surrounding plantings,” a judge noted.

The existing native oak trees, with their low water requirements, called for other California natives, like California Lilac, Toyon, and Coffeeberry, along the perimeters and the brook.

Moving closer to the home, Thorne’s team blended native plants with layered, more lush plantings offering year-round color without having high water requirements. Selections included Mediterranean-climate species like Olives, Lavender, Bay Laurels, Variegated Italian Buckthorn, and Australian Coast Rosemary. Thorne used careful drip irrigation to keep the plants growing and vibrant instead of moving into summer dormancy.

Another judge praised Thorne’s team, saying, “There are moments of brilliance in the planting design. The plant palette, planting composition, and contrast of form and texture are exquisite. The simple, dry-laid, peek-a-boo walk draws the eye through this beautiful landscape.”

The repeating colors and varying textures of the plantings softened the hardscapes, brought unity to the project, and made the experience dynamic.

## Caring for the Environment and Natural Life Through Thoughtful Sustainability

Sustainability has long been considered in DTLA’s designs. With periodic and sustained drought, higher temperatures,



and water-conservation efforts, the DTLA team incorporated Mediterranean and California native plantings to conserve water and provide habitat for native fauna.

One thoughtful way Thorne and his team considered the impact of their plans on the native fauna was by creating a wildlife corridor.

“We were going to fence the entire street, so how do [the deer and wildlife] get to the creek? They couldn’t do it,” said Thorne. He recommended building a 10-foot wildlife corridor with a fence on the property line separating the space from neighbors, offering the wildlife a safe way to reach water without jumping over any fences.

They also used locally sourced willow branches to make up the twin trellises, creating shade in the sunny pool area and off of the primary suite.

The Tuscan-inspired fountains were acquired from a San Francisco company with Italian roots, instead of importing them.

## Crafting Custom Moments

Thorne’s clients wanted to push some points of the design to craft custom moments. The DTLA team stretched their design ability to make these moments come to life in a variety of ways.

As part of the global planning, Thorne realized that the building orientation based on cardinal directions offered lovely opportunities for naturally lighting their design.

“[The layout] gave us the opportunity to take advantage of the low Western light coming through the garden and backlight masses of grasses across the pool area,” said Thorne.

Other unique opportunities were created through repetition. From the main house, the pool anchors the views with its complementary sculptural spa counterpart. Kessel created deliberate and tasteful parallel lines through the design to resonate with the repeating pops of plum-colored foliage. The repeating sets of lines can be seen in the custom willow trellising, paving joints, and gate pickets, unifying the project.

An attractive, custom entry gate welcomed the clients with a custom sign and different widths of pickets, overseen by DTLA’s Ryan Minahan.

As a nod to the clients’ love of California wine country and their own small vineyard, Thorne’s team installed a mini-vineyard on the property.

The sound-dampening fence with special, soft plantings also offered a custom-designed solution to subdue road noise.

“Having a client say, ‘Oh, wow! That’s cool. Nobody’s got an entry gate like that. Nobody’s got a sound-dampening fence or a wildlife corridor.’ I’m proud of those. They’re not off-the-shelf stuff,” said Thorne.

## Recognizing Meaningful Partners

Thorne gratefully accepted the Best of Show award, recognizing the value of the award from his peers.

Tucked away in a suburban corner lot of a closed-in community near Washington, D.C., sits a property that was in need of an upgrade. The garden began as a compacted, sloped landscape with invasive groundcovers, exposed tree roots, and heavy pedestrian traffic cutting through the front yard. The clients sought a private, biodiverse refuge that would manage stormwater, deter foot traffic, and harmonize with both the home's architecture and the neighborhood. The design transformed the entire site—removing lawn and invasives, adding custom boulder steps, patios, walkways, and screening elements—into a native, wildlife supporting landscape. Today, neighbors stop to thank the homeowners for the beauty and biodiversity the garden brings to the community.



### DESIGNER TIP:

*“Focus on each project and making it the best it can be. Don’t be afraid to push your clients past their comfort zone. Listening to clients is one of the most important skills a designer should develop, but listening doesn’t mean the client should tell you how to design.”*

### JUDGES’ FEEDBACK:

This is a wonderful transformation that honors the mid-century architecture while bringing the gardens to a current aesthetic. A very nice blending of grasses and perennials can be seen throughout. The placement of the wooden partition was a clever way to conceal the seating area and also work with the lines of the house.

This Long Beach backyard, once a spacious 60’ by 50’ lot, was reshaped after a new “Granny flat” reduced its size by a third, prompting a full redesign. The remaining space, shaded by the towering main house and flanked by unused slopes with failing retaining walls, needed to accommodate a pool, entertaining areas, and a vegetable garden while integrating the new ADU as a seamless part of the landscape. The designer transformed the sunniest corner into a private retreat with a custom pool, cabana deck, and bamboo screening, while a dry creek bed and salvaged stone staircase introduced a California coastal feel. Concrete paths connect key spaces, and thoughtful touches like a fire pit with stump seating add both flexibility and charm. A dry well beneath the creek bed captures runoff, supporting Long Beach’s sustainability goals and helping this modern, plant-rich backyard function beautifully year-round.

### JUDGES’ FEEDBACK:

The design has brought new life into a previously lackluster garden, accomplished with great use of materials and placement. The wooden platform by the pool, the steps, and the wood slats on the arbor are a warm change of materials. The planting is nice yet simple, as it should be in such a small place.

After moving from a grittier urban area into a more formal neighborhood, the homeowners wanted their new front landscape to reflect the elegance of their colonial-style home—while adding a rebellious, unexpected twist. Inspired by the idea of “an aging rockstar buying an English estate,” the design features sweeping, undulating walkways and curving gravel borders that bring drama and movement to what was once a plain, lawn-dominated yard. The front slope is now a striking display of *Sesleria autumnalis* Autumn Moor Grass, with crisp-edged No-Mow sedge lawns and a blue boulder wall offering both formality and a casual place to sit. White roses and prickly native plants like Prickly Ash add texture and edge, while low-maintenance, drought-tolerant plantings suit the clients’ hands-on approach. At night, lighting highlights the garden’s layered views from both the street and the home’s dramatic front windows, creating a landscape that surprises, welcomes, and performs beautifully day and night.

This rear yard renovation transformed a once-stressful pool area into a tranquil, contemporary garden space tailored for family enjoyment. The redesign began with reshaping the pool to accommodate an automatic safety cover that improved child safety and created an opportunity to simplify hardscape materials and textures. New smooth stucco walls, linear wood fencing, and a restrained palette of native grasses and foliage-rich plantings bring a sense of calm, while preserved mature Acer palmatum offers shade. A hardwood boardwalk bridges the house and garden, discreetly concealing drainage improvements, while lighting and architectural elements ensure the space feels inviting both day and night. Every detail, from locally sourced materials to low-water plants and efficient irrigation, reflects a thoughtful blend of environmental responsibility, contemporary design, and livable beauty.

### JUDGES' FEEDBACK:

A picture of modern tranquility. The design is functional, and the plants add a sense of fun and whimsy while seeming like formal elements at the same time. Unifying the color of the paving and wall, combined with the simple, straight planting lines, nicely helps the overall design.

After 30 years in a Manhattan apartment, the clients arrived in Atlanta ready for a fresh start—and their backyard needed one too. Outdated hardscape, overgrown plants, and a deteriorating shed made way for a clean, modern retreat focused on privacy, simplicity, and low maintenance, with space for their dog to roam. The design team preserved only a remnant of an old wall for historical continuity, replacing the rest with crisp stucco planters and seat walls, a contemporary fence, and a Pennsylvania bluestone patio. Plantings were kept minimal, with a perennial strip for personal touches, and a beloved existing water feature was seamlessly integrated into the design. Despite major challenges, including drainage issues, a massive city stormwater lid, and difficult site access, the final design quietly resolves them all, delivering a calm, functional, and beautifully modern outdoor space.

The existing landscape of this French-inspired home had grown unruly after two decades of minimal maintenance, with oversized shrubs obscuring the architecture. The clients wanted to refresh the space without expanding the gardens or altering the hardscape, seeking a more open, inviting look with areas of negative space and a renovated pool patio. Custom steel trellises with climbing David Austin roses now soften the once-blank front walls, while carefully selected deer-resistant perennials and evergreens provide structure and color. In the back, a heat-reflective paver was chosen to mimic bluestone around the regraded pool patio, and outdated plantings were replaced with compact shrubs and perennials for seasonal interest. The result is a clean, elegant landscape that enhances the home’s charm while blending seamlessly into the wilder edges of the property.

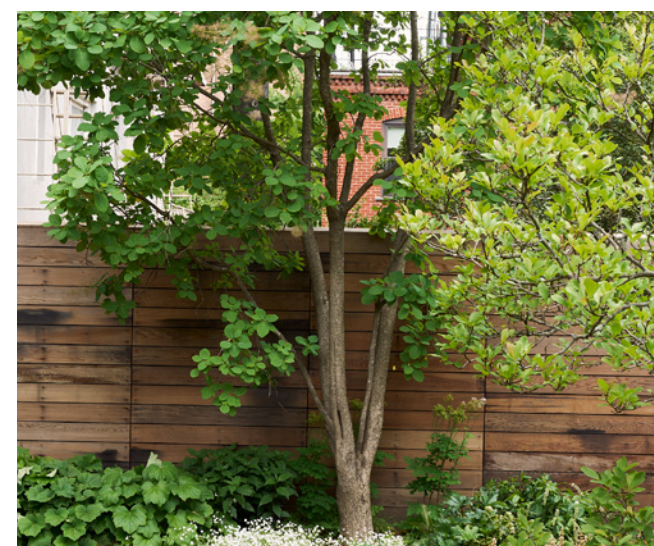

Nestled in the heart of Clinton Hill, Brooklyn, two Greek Revival homes from the 1840s stand as the oldest houses in the neighborhood. These homes, a joint purchase by a brother and sister with young children, were chosen not only for their historical significance but also for the expansive backyard—a perfect canvas for their dream of creating a shared family space. The goal was clear: a sustainable, energy-efficient garden that would provide a safe and engaging environment for the children to play and the families to gather, all while maintaining the heritage of the property.

During the renovation, fireproof bricks from the original timber-frame structures were reclaimed and repurposed throughout the garden, while sustainability guided every detail from passive drainage systems and reclaimed materials to a green roof and native plantings. Anchored by mature trees, custom patios, and a series of stepped planting beds tailored to each family's vision, the garden now thrives as an ecologically rich, resilient space where both children and adults connect, play, and grow together.

### JUDGES' FEEDBACK:

This is an inspiring makeover of a property. Honoring the architecture and surrounds while bringing it into the 21st century has been skillfully achieved. The use of repurposed materials, drainage mitigation, and planting for ecology shows a commitment to the client's wishes. Spatial awareness and balance are evident in the just-right size/shape spaces for each property, while still creating an overall unified space. The plantings are nicely distributed with a balance of trees, shrubs and perennials that create private dining spaces. Favorite elements: reuse of bricks and redwood, use of curved lines on the ground plane in an otherwise linear space. Nicely done!

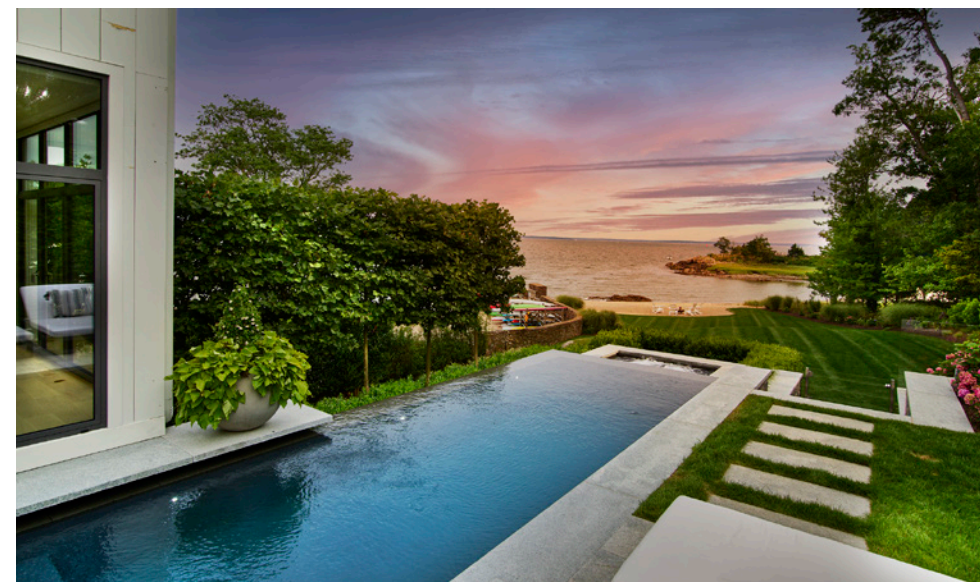

From rubble to refuge, this beachfront property was given a second chance. What was once a raw construction site with scattered debris and overgrown invasives was transformed into a refined coastal retreat overlooking Long Island Sound. The clients envisioned more than just a backyard; they dreamed of a space that blended family-friendly function with natural elegance. Layered terraces now tame the steep terrain, creating zones for play, relaxation, and entertainment—including a pool, outdoor kitchen, and firepit—all while preserving views and ensuring privacy from a neighboring beach club. Native plants were protected, invasive species removed, and runoff carefully managed, allowing the landscape to thrive in harmony with its surroundings. Every detail, from custom glass railings to restored beachfront pathways, was crafted to turn a disrupted site into a seamless, sustainable sanctuary.



### JUDGES' FEEDBACK:

The layout and sizing of activity spaces are nicely balanced, showing spatial awareness. The slope is now a beautiful feature, rather than a problem, with grading and attractive walls to create an upper terrace. All in all, a stunning transformation that satisfies the client's requests.

Set in a historic district, the landscape had suffered years of neglect: chaotic plantings, nutrient-poor soil, and privacy concerns overshadowed the home's recent interior revival. The new design embraced the home's historic charm, replacing disjointed elements with graceful garden rooms, repurposed brick patios, and soft mass plantings that invite color, texture, and calm. Views from the kitchen, library, and master bedroom now open onto lush vignettes of climbing roses, 'Golden Wings' blooms, and a shaded mountain meadow retreat. With smart irrigation, local materials, and low-voltage lighting, the renewed landscape offers both sustainability and year-round enchantment.

Located beside a centuries-old castle wall, this garden feels lifted from the pages of a storybook. This fairytale cottage and its east-facing garden called for a design that balanced heritage with enchantment. Inspired by old maps and the well's original use as a communal water source, the layout became a journey of discovery with brick paths winging past topiary, sunken seating, and a rill that flows gently from the restored well. A formal knot garden gives way to a loose wildflower meadow, filled with roses, shrubs, and seasonal blooms that invite both pollinators and pause. Reclaimed stone, native species, and thoughtful planting ensure the garden remains as timeless and rooted as the land it shares with the castle.



### DESIGNER TIP:

*"Look to the history of the site, it is often the richest source of inspiration. By studying old maps and understanding the significance of the well, we created a garden that felt as though it had always belonged."* – Jo Thompson



### JUDGES' FEEDBACK:

This is a lovely transformation of a dated and neglected garden. The cottage, gardens and surrounds are seamlessly connected by appropriate hardscape materials and layered plantings that immerse you in the space. The inviting winding path creates nicely shaped and balanced spaces, providing an interesting journey. The rill enhances the spatial division and guides visitors on their walk from start to finish, as well as draws wildlife into the garden.

Set on a private road, this hillside property was transformed into a vibrant, nature-conscious retreat that balances recreation, relaxation, and timeless design. Centered around a large pool and natural play lawn, the landscape was carefully integrated with the new build home and designed to reflect the family's active, social lifestyle. A covered "California Room" serves as the heart of the space, complete with a heated lounge and central bar area, while heat-resistant porcelain tile hardscapes offer durability and style without overwhelming the natural setting. Mature heritage oaks and redwoods were preserved and celebrated, with native, low-water plantings thoughtfully layered throughout to soften built elements and reinforce a connection to the land. Sustainable choices, from solar energy and low-voltage lighting to real turf and minimized concrete use, support a design that's both environmentally responsible and effortlessly inviting.

### JUDGES' FEEDBACK:

This design beautifully integrates the built landscape with the existing surrounds, while extensive plants and layering connect the spaces. Tree protection and the use of low-water plants and natives are commendable and demonstrate respect for the environment. The spaces are appropriately sized and well defined.

Once part of a historic coastal farm, Orchard Bay still carries the legacy of its beech, oak, and elm trees, open lawns, and sweeping water views. 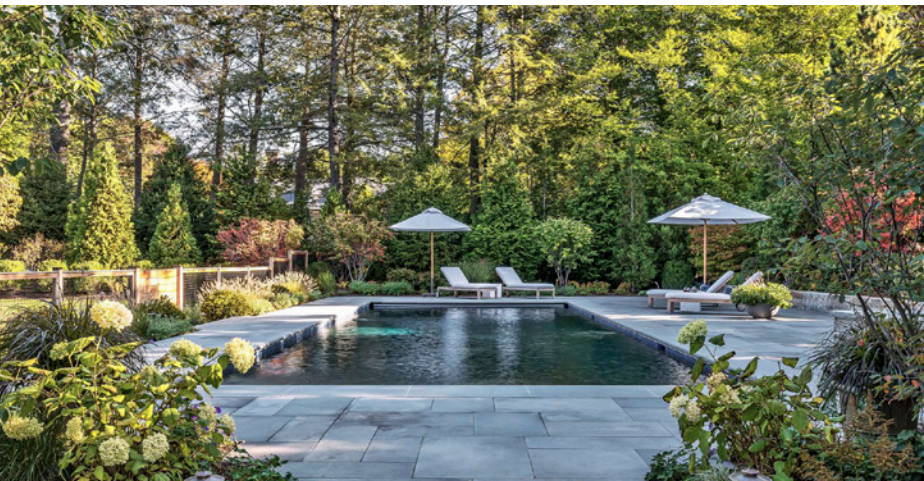

Framed by public roads and shaped by resilience, this Boston estate reclaims a long-forgotten lot. Surrounded on three sides by busy streets in a Boston suburb, this double lot had sat vacant and overgrown for nearly a decade before the client's vision brought it back to life. Nestled among declining trees and aggressive invasives, the site was carefully cleared, preserving healthy native oaks, pines, and maples while making way for a grand shingle-style home at its center. With 360-degree views from the interior, the landscape design balances openness with privacy, using layered native plantings instead of traditional hedges to screen roads and neighboring properties. Modern amenities, including a pool, spa, and outdoor kitchen, are connected by crisp bluestone walkways, while a thoughtful mix of native species supports pollinators, reduces maintenance, and fosters a sense of countryside serenity in an urban setting. The landscape architect led all phases of design, permitting, and construction, ensuring every detail served both the clients' lifestyle and long-term environmental stewardship.



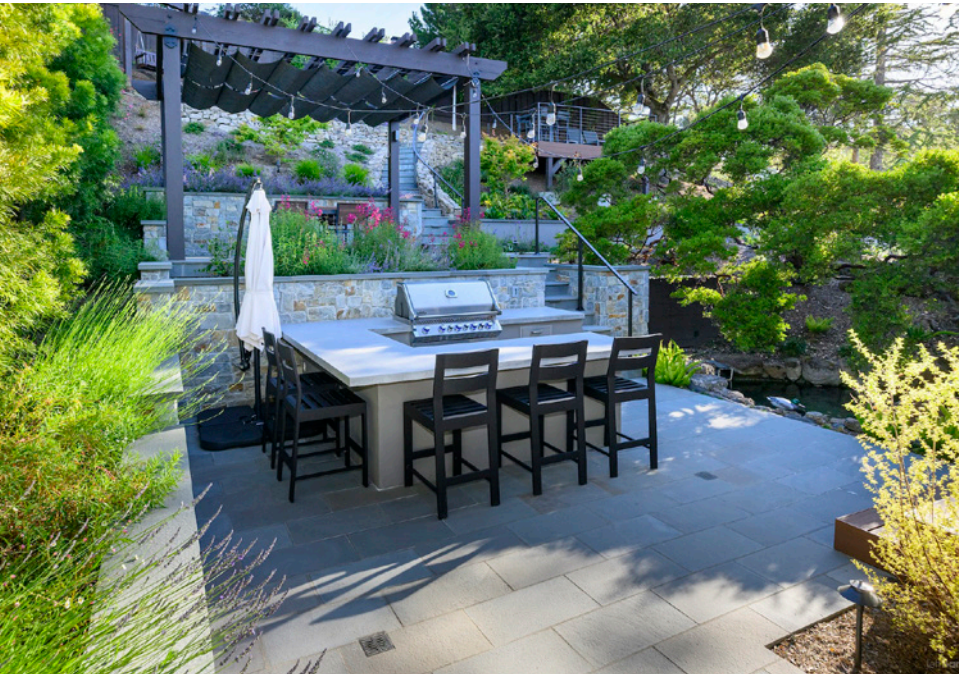

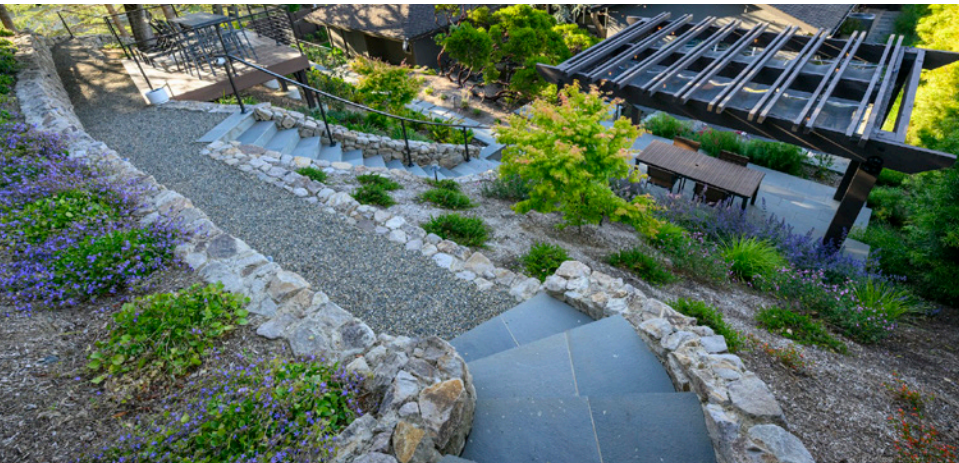

The house is surrounded by a narrow ring of flat terrain, which is less than 15 feet deep, before the land slopes: rising steeply 20 feet at a 2:1 pitch behind the home, offering a breathtaking Bay view from the top, descending more gently in front and on the side. The rocky, clay-loam soil challenged the transformation requested by the active family, who dreamed of outdoor spaces that blend function with beauty: a kitchen, covered patio, fire pit, view deck, small lawn, and colorful, privacy-enhancing gardens. The design carefully preserved the property’s natural assets, including heritage trees and a stunning Manzanita, while shaping terraces, patios, and pathways that flowed naturally through each zone. Outdoor “rooms” now connect via graceful steps and curves, each with its own character, making the landscape not only livable, but magical.

Nestled along the shores of Duxbury Bay, this project revitalized the landscape of a charming coastal home by improving the functionality and flow of the outdoor space while framing views of the bay. The project has been a ten-year process to create a welcoming hub where extended family can gather, relax, and make lasting memories. At the heart of the design is a reimagined pool area, which is complemented by lush plantings and a bluestone patio that offers ample space for relaxation and entertainment.

Three 20-foot caissons anchor the pool into bedrock, finished with cobalt PebbleTec, deep green Tunisian tile, and Grecian travertine decking, all framed by glass railings to preserve sweeping views of downtown L.A. The landscape honors the 1920s Mediterranean bungalow aesthetic, using repurposed stone, brick, and concrete to define tiered planting and firepit areas. From a pergola-shaded entertainment space to flowering maples and agave gardens cascading down the slope, every element balances structural ingenuity with lush, old-world charm, turning an impossible site into a hillside oasis.

Tucked into a canyon-facing Mediterranean-style home, the original site offered little more than grass, a patch of unusable flagstone, and an outdated BBQ. The client requested a covered lounge with a fire element, dining area, water feature, and citrus trees, all in a Mediterranean aesthetic with a preference for rectangular pavers. The design team’s goal was to meet these needs while creating a unique and inviting space that encouraged time outdoors. The final design includes a patio cover with a solid, tile-matched roof, a fireplace as a focal point, an intimate dining bosque with olive trees, and layered plantings to preserve the views. Sustainable features include a rain chain, drip irrigation, Mediterranean plantings, and LED lighting, all thoughtfully integrated into a cohesive, year-round garden.

As avid birdwatchers, the clients envisioned a landscape that would attract a variety of bird species and wildlife by offering natural food sources, water, and shelter— while also providing play areas for their children that seamlessly integrate with the natural surroundings. The design embraces the site’s natural topography to create a multi-tiered outdoor environment that balances habitat creation with engaging play spaces. A Buffalograss lawn crowns the upper level, while stone steps lead to a mid-tier play area featuring a slide, sandbox, and native berry plantings. At the lowest level, winding paths connect a variety of interactive features from a firepit and dry streambeds to a willow tunnel, climbing wall, and reading nook all woven together into a continuous loop. Native plantings, brush piles, and a boulder water feature support local wildlife, creating a landscape that’s as ecologically rich as it is imaginative.

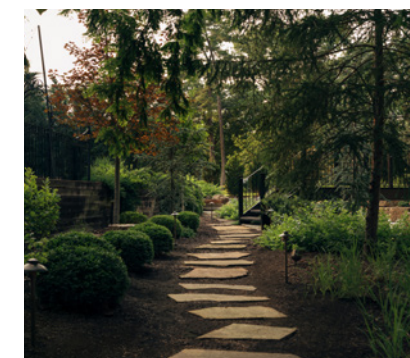

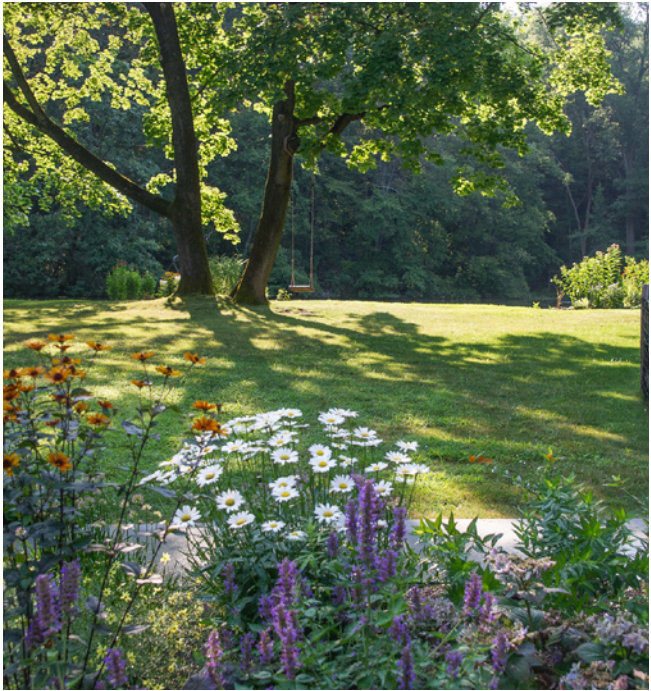

Following extensive home renovations, this property needed a landscape that could both heal and thrive. The site, marked by compacted soils and varied sun exposure, features a prominent man-made pond in the front yard and a steep backyard slope bordering a golf course. The clients sought a master plan that embraced a naturalistic aesthetic while solving practical concerns, such as erosion, stormwater runoff, and a lack of privacy. Native plants were the foundation of the design, creating biodiverse habitat corridors, stabilizing the slope, and filtering nutrient-laden runoff before it entered the pond. 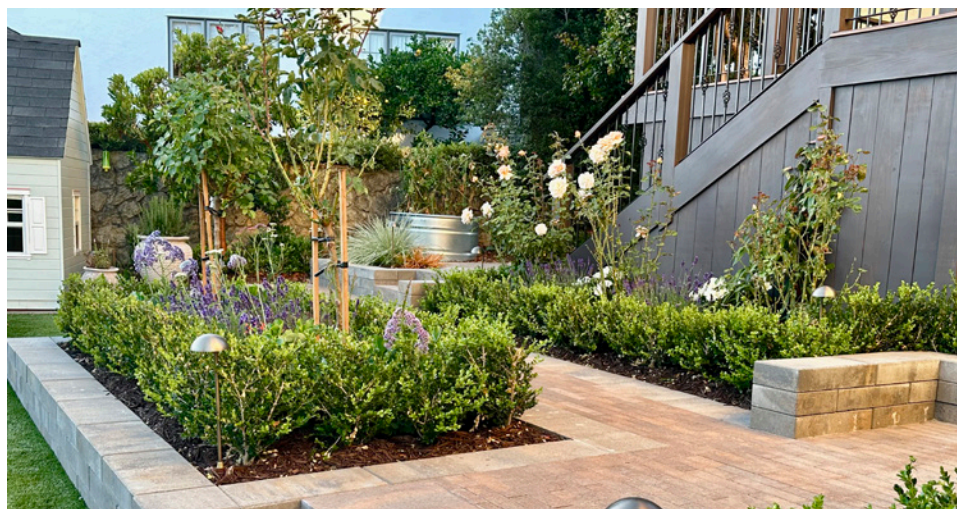

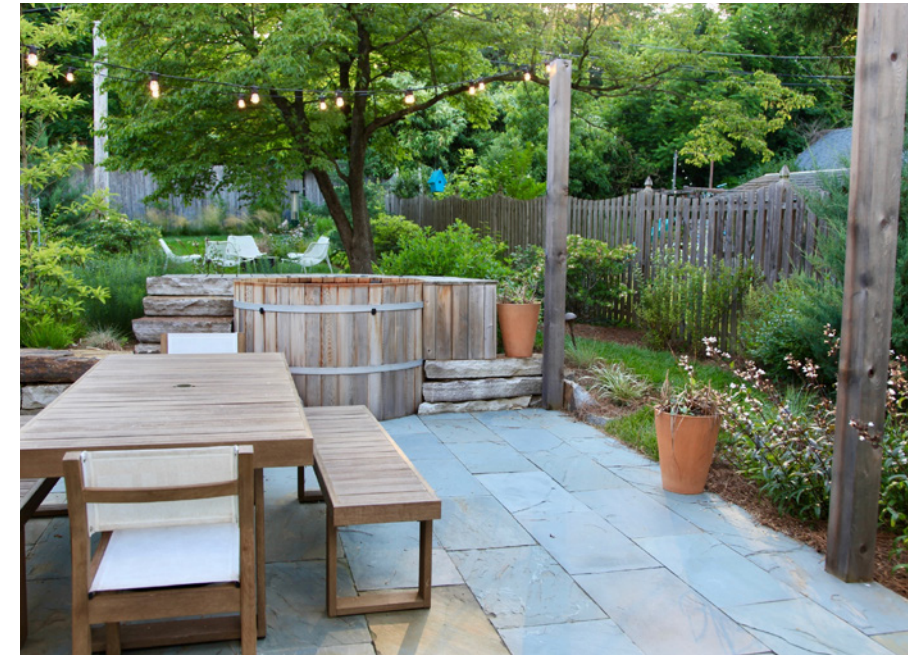

Set on a steeply sloped lot, this split-level property posed both challenges and opportunities for transforming underutilized terrain into inviting outdoor spaces. 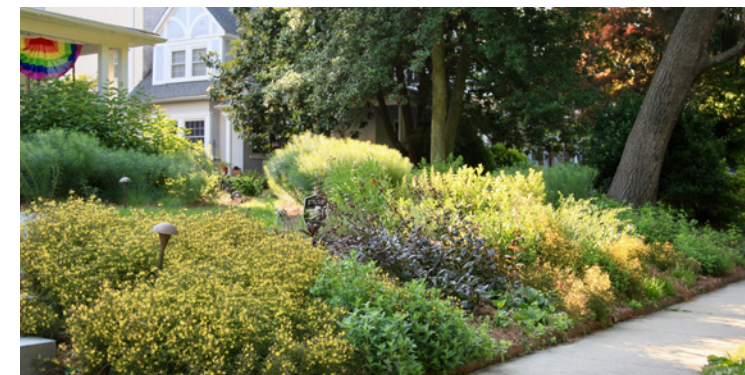

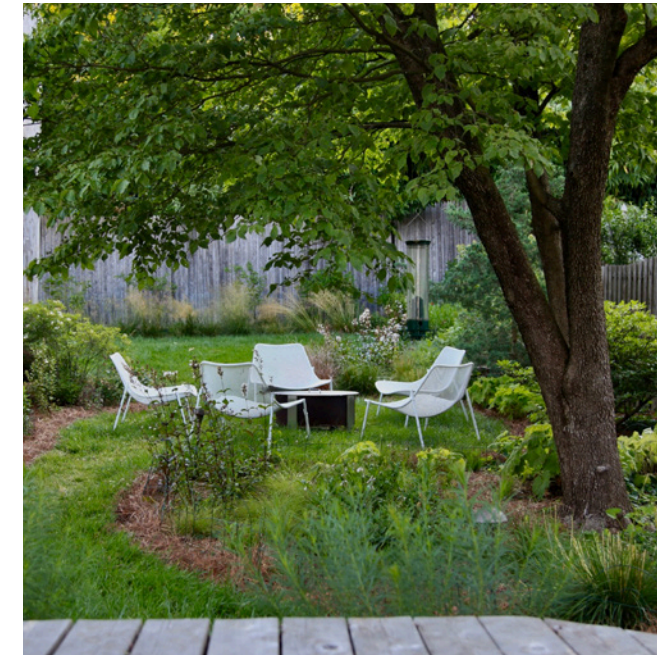

Once a sloping lawn with poor drainage and turf grass, this Philadelphia property has been transformed into a vibrant, functional habitat for people, wildlife, and plants. Designed and built in Fall 2022, the team embraced the site's steep grading to craft a tiered outdoor living space with a dining area, hot tub, firepit, and raised beds while effectively channeling stormwater to a native-planted rain garden in the front. Locally sourced materials, including Pennsylvania Bluestone and chunk stone, blend seamlessly with custom-built elements like cedar steps, trellising, and a cutting garden. As part of a larger neighborhood greenway of 100 similar gardens, this project prioritizes ecological connectivity, stormwater management, and a beautiful, biodiverse environment, all rooted in sustainable design.

While this one-acre site presented many challenges, the designers were able to bring the client's vision of a dynamic, naturalistic garden that encourages interaction and exploration to life. The design intent focused on creating a progression of immersive spaces, enticing the homeowners to journey through and discover a constantly evolving garden.

The site, densely planted with a mix of native and cosmopolitan species, mimics natural ecologies to promote soil remediation, improve water infiltration, and support animal and insect habitats. From the entrance featuring Oak, Cornelian Cherry, and Ironwood trees underplanted with layers of spring bulbs, warm- and cool-season grasses, and flowering perennials to the groves of Carpinus and Cercis along the western edge, every corner was carefully designed and remediated with intentional plantings.

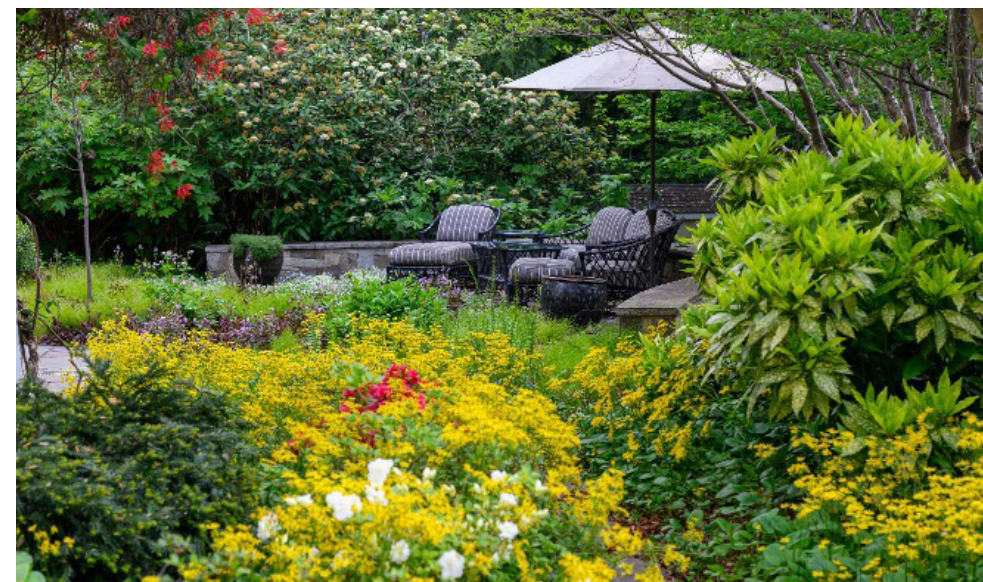
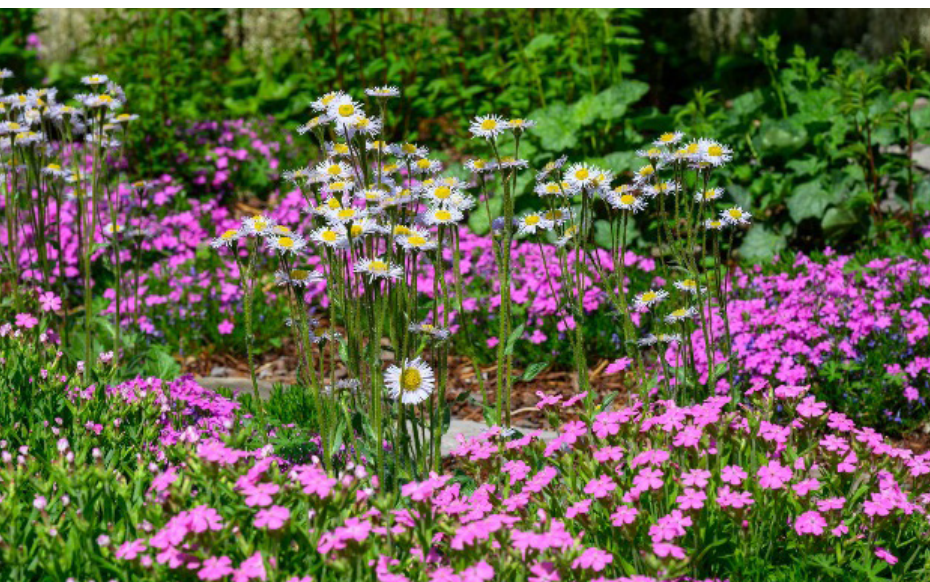

On a suburban lot in Bethesda, Maryland, a dramatic transformation unfolded in two stages. The backyard, once dominated by a disused swimming pool and plagued by stormwater runoff and compacted soils, was reimagined as a native plant haven designed to support biodiversity and manage water on-site. The design team regarded the landscape, added swales for drainage, and installed a custom-drilled boulder fountain to serve as a water source for migratory birds. Impressed by the success of the back garden, the homeowner commissioned a second phase to replace the traditional front lawn with a habitat-rich landscape that incorporated existing features like a mature Japanese maple and roses. In just two years, the property evolved from ecologically barren to a vibrant, functional, and visually cohesive sanctuary for pollinators, birds, and people alike.

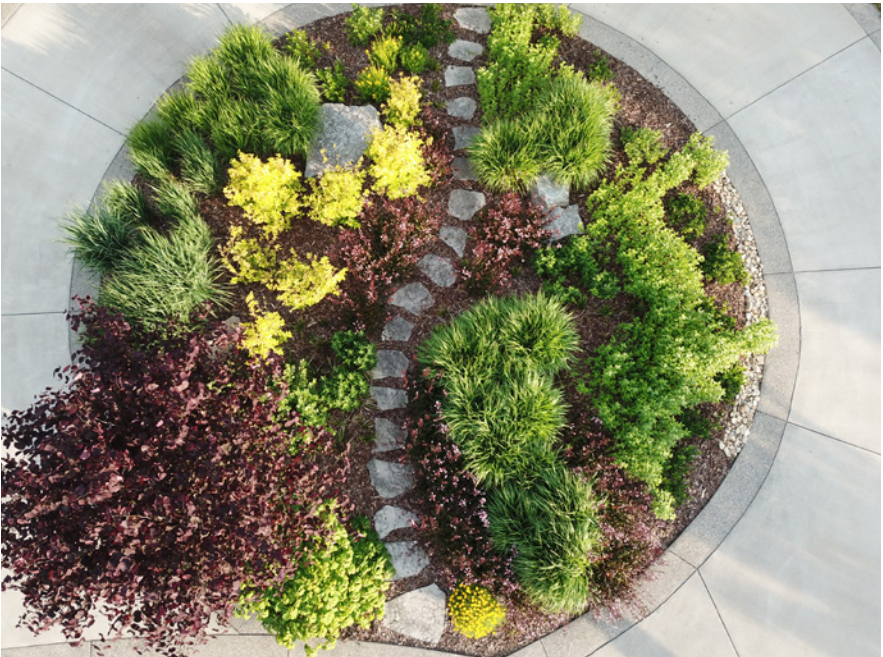

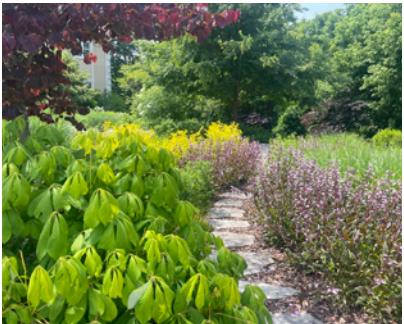

Layered native species, flowering perennials, forest-edge plantings, and dry-stacked stonework now support both biodiversity and beauty, creating a sanctuary where wild turkeys, butterflies, birds, and even salamanders thrive in harmony with the landscape.

Tucked behind Corten steel fencing, a sculptural home by Ehrlich Architects opens to the outdoors with sliding glass walls and decks that float above a reflecting pool. Though set on a narrow lot with minimal planting space, the home's skewed geometry and bold materials called for a landscape equally rich in character. The clients, an art-loving, tech-savvy couple, dreamed of a tropical jungle that could soften the architecture without competing with it, while also creating spaces for entertaining, lounging, and cooking. The resulting design weaves lush planting pockets, zigzag hardwood paths, and low, built-in lounging platforms seamlessly into the home's angular rhythm. Burle Marx-inspired plantings, staghorn ferns, and orchid "bombs" animate the space, while permeable surfaces, subtle lighting, and low-water strategies ground the garden in both function and beauty.

This shady podium courtyard, once a forgotten slab of concrete, was transformed into a tranquil extension of the clients’ contemporary home, offering views of immersive greenery from both kitchen doors and the balcony above. Inspired by the fern-covered meaning of “Farringdon” and the site’s 19th-century history of fine metalwork, the design layers delicate tree ferns and rich bronze detailing to evoke both softness and strength. Lightweight construction and shallow soil depths demanded innovation, with tree ferns planted at staggered heights to offer privacy without blocking light. Painted brick walls, black mirrors, and carefully selected textures complete a secluded urban retreat that feels far from the rush of city life, while staying rooted in its history and place.

What began as an eroding corner property with an uninviting patio and obstructed views was reimagined into a layered, elegant retreat that grounds the expansive Mayan-Spanish home in both form and function. The redesigned patio unfolds in two levels: an upper lounge with built-in seating and a firepit, and a lower terrace off the primary suite, where a redwood hot tub nestles beneath an expanded balcony. Everywhere, texture and detail elevate the experience: colorful tile, vintage wood cabinetry, seeded pebble grout, and curving flagstone lines that echo the shoreline. With erosion addressed by Corten steel terraces and native, low-water plantings, the landscape not only anchors the home but celebrates its setting by welcoming coastal views, filtering stormwater, and inviting birds and pollinators back to the land.

Perched atop a newly built downtown home, this compact 275-square-foot L-shaped roof deck faced intense sun exposure, soaring daytime temperatures, and high winds, with no shade or comfort to speak of. The space's awkward layout and bulky furnishings rendered it virtually unusable despite its incredible city skyline views. The design team was tasked with transforming it into a cool, family-friendly retreat for a couple and their toddler, all while contending with weight restrictions and access challenges (four flights of stairs). A custom wood pergola with angled rafters, anchored to a newly built platform deck, became the key to adding shade without compromising the roof membrane. Light gray decking, compact furnishings, a turf play strip, low-maintenance container gardens, and a recirculating fountain completed the transformation, making the rooftop an inviting destination worth the climb.

This Spanish-style home's courtyard had long struggled to complement the grand arched breezeway that defines its entrance. The client desired a low-maintenance, Mediterranean-inspired design that would connect the courtyard and driveway with year-round beauty, visible from both inside and outside the home. The new design introduced a carefully laid Quartzite flagstone path, a water feature framed from the living room window and layered plantings that brought softness and structure. Lavender, roses, and grasses lend a romantic, billowing effect, while evergreens like Osmanthus and Escallonia provide winter interest. Every archway now frames a thoughtfully composed view, and drought-tolerant selections bridge the sunnier driveway with the shaded courtyard, uniting the space in timeless harmony.

Beneath the dappled shade of mature trees, an underused corner of a public park has been quietly transformed into a contemplative retreat for visitors of all ages and abilities. What once was a simple turf lawn now hosts a hand-crafted stone labyrinth, anchored by a dry-stacked wall that offers seating, sensory exploration, and a subtle invitation to pause. Designed with accessibility, sustainability, and budget in mind, the space embraces the site's natural grade and tree canopy while introducing low-maintenance, nature-forward solutions. Locally sourced materials and preserved tree cover keep the design grounded in its environment, while thoughtful details like a commemorative plaque boulder reflect community collaboration. The result is a quiet, beautiful space that invites reflection, connection, and gentle movement.

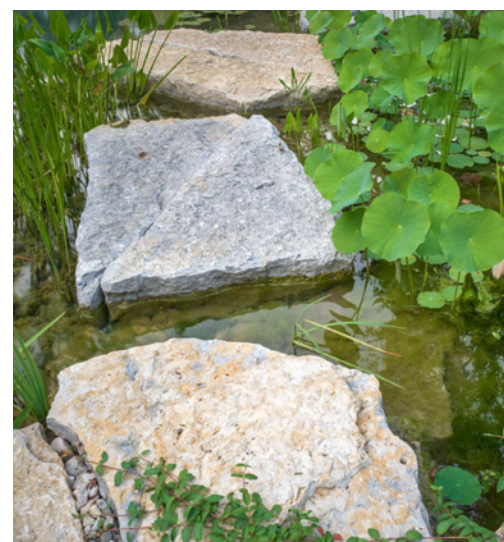

Tucked behind a narrow 10-foot side yard and framed by mature trees, a suburban backyard in Chicago has been reimagined as a serene, spa-like sanctuary. Despite tight access, the team carved out a space where natural beauty meets therapeutic function, centering on a beach-sand swimming pool shimmering with oxygen-rich microbubbles and flecks of mica. Raised garden beds, fragrant perennials, and a renovated waterfall enhance the sensory experience, while stone paths and soft turf invite slow, intentional movement. A separate lotus and lily pond adds a moment of stillness, blurring the line between garden and water. Designed for health, beauty, and biodiversity, the result is a private retreat that nourishes both body and soul.

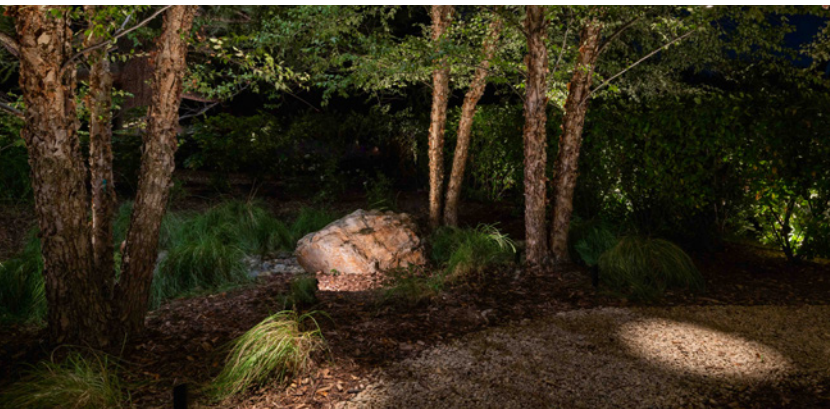

After years of hosting events with temporary lighting, this longtime client was officially ready to invest in a permanent solution that matched the elegance and functionality of their home. Removing the lackluster lighting system installed by the original landscape architect, the team installed a comprehensive design featuring 248 fixtures, including repurposed existing lights, that now wrap around the entire property. The result is a beautifully lit landscape with defined, usable spaces enhanced by a three-zone audio system for seamless outdoor entertainment. Thoughtful custom elements bring depth and personality, such as an antique family stove converted into a glowing art piece, and RGBW lighting on a central fire-feature sculpture. With layered techniques including wall washes, in grade lighting, illuminated glass rods, and a variety of path and downlights, the entire property now feels cohesive, dynamic, and full of color.

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
